- Nancy Lysell, Central High: high school art students will use a digital camera to create self-portraits using four special effects.

The Salina Education Foundation believes that active, engaged learners will retain more meaningful information. Creative approaches and hands-on involvement in projects are what the Outside-the-Box Grant is all about. For the second year, Jeff Platt's South Middle School 8th graders will have an opportunity to immerse themselves in an historic Supreme Court case.

They'll take part in the Eisenhower Center's Five-Star Leader Program, which will recreate the events of the 1957 public school integration crisis precipitated by the U.S. Supreme Court case, Brown vs. Topeka Board of Education. Each student will receive a workbook for classroom study. They'll travel to the Eisenhower Museum in Abilene to participate in teams, analyze documents, and prepare for a comprehensive briefing and a news conference. Finally, they'll play the roles of historical figures and recreate the three pivotal weeks of September 1957.

- Carolyn Goodwin, Meadowlark: K-5th grade students with emotional and behavioral disturbances will use differentiated instructional materials to help each student master Kansas reading and math standards.
- Jane King, Oakdale: K-2nd grade students will use a phonological awareness center that teaches young students the skills essential to learn to read.
- Nancy Bauer, Schilling: Elementary students will provide accompaniment to songs, play rhythmic patterns, read melody, and improvise their own melodies using ORFF instruments.
- Mary Harmon, Schilling: The Schilling library will receive a set of 24 bilingual books that are ideal for beginning language learners.
- Lyric Cairns, South High: South High students
 will participate in two physics projects.
 Students will conduct a science camp for 4th
 and 5th graders in the "Physicist for a Day"
 project. "Roller Coaster Physics" will allow
 students to build amusement park models and
 test relevant concepts in physics.
- Chuck VanGundy, South High: Working in the on-site greenhouse, students from many different departments will learn how to run a business, care for plant materials, and understand botany with support materials provided by an SEF grant.
- Barbara Livengood, South Middle: Robotics club will receive six additional Lego NXT kits, which allow students to build and program robots to accomplish various tasks. The students will test their skills at a competition at Ft. Hays State University. Funded by Philips Lighting donation.
- Lisa Hall, Melinda Eitel, and Marcy Frain, Stewart: Third graders will use wireless weather stations to monitor weather conditions three times a day, organize the information into spreadsheets, and create graphs for different weather statistics. The project will culminate in a presentation to parents.
- Kim Stoeber, School Social Worker: Continue support for the School Social Worker Fund,
